Welcome to ESL 116B! I'm happy you're here. Please read the whole syllabus carefully, and be sure to ask questions about anything you're not sure about. The syllabus contains important information and class policies.

Course Description

This course emphasizes the development of reading and writing skills including varied sentence types, use of phrases and clauses, grammar and mechanics, paragraphs, summary-response, short essays, the writing process, and small group and whole class work to strengthen basic reading skills and to make inferences and to read critically. Prerequisite: ESL 116A/540A or eligibility for ESL 116B/540B on the Placement Exam Score.

Student Learning Outcome

- 1. Identify parts of speech, subjects, verbs, and objects. **Requires Critical Thinking**
- 2. Identify and use basic types of phrases and clauses. **Requires Critical Thinking**
- 3. Distinguish between dependent and independent clauses.
- 4. Correctly use infinitive phrases, gerund phrases, and the three basic conditionals.
- 5. Demonstrate appropriate use of simple and perfect tenses.
- 6. Recognize and correct run-ons, fragments, and comma splices.
- 7. Correctly write compound and complex sentences.
- 8. Demonstrate correct use of transitional words.
- 9. Write effective topic sentences and develop them into unified and coherent paragraphs.
- 10. Identify and write narrative, descriptive, and exemplification paragraphs and short essays.
- 11. Analyze short reading passages as models for writing. **Requires Critical Thinking**
- 12. Understand and apply the writing process steps.
- 13. Correctly use end-marks and commas in series and compound sentences.
- 14. Apply basic strategies for vocabulary building and increase his/her basic reading vocabulary. **Requires Critical Thinking**
- 15. Read and comprehend short passages with 70% mastery.
- 16. Recognize simple text patterns in paragraphs and short passages with 70% mastery.

- 17. Outline or map short text passages with 70% mastery.
- 18. Demonstrate understanding of some basic reasoning errors in what he or she reads on criterion-referenced tests.
- 19. Correctly infer main idea. **Requires Critical Thinking**

Textbooks

The Omnivore's Dilemma: The secrets behind what you eat (Young Readers Edition) by Michael Pollan

Some readings will be provided as PDFs. You will need to be able to print some, and some will be provided in class.

A College-level English Dictionary is also recommended, but not required.

Other Requirements

You are expected to have regular access to a computer for typing assignments and **check your school email and Canvas course site regularly**. You will also need paper, pen/pencils and highlighters regularly in class.

You are expected to attend and actively participate in class, which includes arriving prepared with materials and texts. You will be expected to print readings and paper drafts to work with. Save all handouts, homework, and drafts of work for the semester.

Attendance Policy

Being in class is a basic part of participation and important. Missing classes can negatively impact your grade as you will miss out on tasks and group work that cannot be made up. If you have **4 or more absences you may be dropped from the course with or without notice.** If you have extenuating circumstances (e.g. documentable medical emergency of you or a close family member, death or other serious crisis) you may not be dropped if you are in good standing in the class. If you find yourself in such a situation prompt communication with the instructor is key and I will work with you to attempt completing the course if at all possible.

Being habitually late it is rude to the instructor and your classmates. If you arrive late you will not have extra time to complete warm up activities and cannot make them up. **Missing 30 minutes of class without informing the instructor before or at the beginning of class will count as an absence** (30 minutes late, leaving early, or missing time in the middle of class).

You are allowed to make up, at most, two classes by working with a tutor in the WLDC. You will be expected to have documentation.

Homework/Classwork
